Dear Upper School Parents,

It feels surreal to be thinking about the return of school, but as August begins we at Wheeler are starting to rev our engines yet again for the fall. While many have taken full advantage of the opportunity to rest and re-energize over the past few weeks, Wheeler itself never sleeps; this summer in Providence, crews have been hard at work completing the renovation of the Hope Building, various groups (including Breakthrough Providence and a number of summer camp groups) have made the most of our classroom spaces, and our administrative and maintenance staff have been hard at work even while students and faculty have been away.

As excited as I was to take on the role of interim Dean of Students last summer, I'm even more delighted to be starting my second year with the knowledge and experience I was able to gain through my work last year (partly because the interim tag is gone, so I feel even more official). This work with students and families is compelling and fulfilling, and I look forward to opportunities to deepen those connections this year, while making new ones with the class of 2023!

I have once again spent the bulk of my summer at the Wheeler Farm, working at Wheeler Summer Camp and regularly being taken aback by the beauty and serenity of the place. While I have always considered the Farm to be a special spot, and have treasured my time here as a coach in the fall, an avid basketball fan in the winter, and a participant in the many traditions around graduation in the spring, not until this summer have I really appreciated the way this place serves as a living organism and a reflection of all that Wheeler has to offer. While many of us who attempt to take care of our own lawns can appreciate what it must take to maintain 8 playing fields and 120 acres, watching it happen is a wonder; the small Farm staff (4 full time employees!) works from dawn to dusk mowing fields, painting lines, clearing brush, repairing and replacing equipment, cleaning, planting, and too many other tasks to mention. At times in the summer there are close to 500 people on the Farm campus (not to mention the groups that might rent the spaces after the end of the camp day), and each morning the grounds are ready to do it all again. The Farm is also home to all types of wildlife who take over after dark (and sometimes make cameos during the day) - this summer we've seen more groundhogs than we can count, deer, osprey, frogs, and a racing pigeon even dropped in on a swim lesson in the pool! It's no wonder that the Farm Friday program in Early Childhood at Wheeler has been such a success, and that the 6th grade Farm program has been such a treasured memory for students who have come through our middle school. If you haven't had the opportunity to spend time at the Farm (or you just haven't been here recently), I can't recommend it more highly; for students, I'm excited that we will have a chance to bring the entire Upper School out here again for Jamboree and SeptemberFest this fall so we can all experience this amazing location together. In her welcome letter on the school's website, Allison Gaines Pell describes the "buzz" that exists in every nook and cranny of Wheeler - that "buzz" extends out to Seekonk as well, and I hope you can all make it out to see for yourselves soon!
