Assistive Technology for Your Child

<u>Learning Ally</u> This program offers struggling learners equitable access to the books they want to read and the grade-level content they need to read. The library of audiobooks is extensive and the recordings are human voices.

<u>Read Naturally</u> This research-based reading intervention has helped millions of students become fluent readers and make solid gains in comprehension and vocabulary.

<u>Google Read&Write</u> This Chrome extension provides both text-to-speech and speech-to-text tools to assist with reading, writing, and studying.

<u>Speechify</u> An application that reads printed text. The goal of Speechify, created by a person with dyslexia, is to ensure that reading is not a barrier to learning.

<u>Explode the Code</u> Data-driven phonics instruction online. Research-based individualized instruction with ongoing progress monitoring and reporting.

<u>Bookshare</u> With an e-book library of nearly one million titles, Bookshare makes reading easier for people with diverse reading and learning styles.

<u>Grammarly</u> This Chrome extension assists with spelling and grammar in one's work, but also assists with style and tone in a given piece of writing.
